### 1.1.1 601 Series

There are five models in this series:i) 601AMiii) 601BMv) 601BS4ii) 601ASiv) 601BM4

The 601 series all support a VIA PLE133 (VT8601A) northbridge chipset. The 601A series support a VT82C686A southbridge chipset whereas the 601B series supports a VT82C686B southbridge chipset. The chipsets for the 601AM, 601AS and 601BM models all have 2x AGP support. The chipsets for the 601BM4 and 601BS4 have 4x AGP support.

### Desktop Management Interface (DMI)

The mainboard comes with a DMI 2.0 built into the BIOS. The DMI utility in the BIOS will automatically record different information about your system configuration and store this information in the DMI pool, which is a part of the system board's Plug and Play BIOS. DMI, along with the appropriately networked software, is designed for easy inventory, maintenance and to simplify troubleshooting of computer systems.

### WOL (Wake-On-Lan) Port: - Optional for the 601BS4

One WOL connector supports Wake-On-LAN functionality.

### **USB** Ports

The mainboard is equipped with 2 USB ports and 2 USB connectors for expansion. USB allows data exchange between your computer and a wide range of simultaneously accessible external Plug and Play peripherals. (Cable for two connectors are optional and sold separately).

### IrDA Interface :- Optional for the 601BS4

The mainboard is equipped with an IrDA connector for wireless connectivity between your computer and peripheral devices. It supports peripheral devices that meet the HPSIR or ASKIR standard.

### Utility Panel: - Optional for the 601AS and 601BS4

The Utility Panel (UP) brings the MIC-IN, LINE-IN and Earphones lines, together with some USB ports, to the front of the system. The UP can be connected to the internal Front Audio Connector. The UP is shown below.





### 1.3 System Health Monitor Functions

The mainboard is capable of monitoring the following system health conditions:

- 1. Monitors processor temperature and overheat alarm.
- 2. Monitors VCORE/3.3V/5V/12V/2.5V voltages and failure alarm.
- 3. Monitors processor/chassis fan speed and failure alarm.
- 4. Read back capability that displays temperature, voltage and fan speed.

### 1.3.1 Hardware Monitoring System Utility

The mainboard comes with the Hardware Monitoring System utility contained on the CD that comes with your mainboard. It is capable of monitoring the system's hardware conditions such as the temperature of the processor and system, voltage, and speed of the CPU and chassis fans. You are allowed to manually set a range to the items being monitored. If the values are over or under the set range, a warning message will pop-up. The utility can also be configured to allow a beeping alarm to sound whenever an error occurs. We recommend that you use the Default Setting, which is the ideal setting that would maintain the system in good working condition.

### 1.3.2 Installation of HMSU

To install the utility, please insert the CD Driver into the CD-ROM drive. The auto run screen (Driver Utility) will automatically appear. Click the Hardware Monitoring category, chose the model number and OS to install. Please refer to the Driver CD "Readme" file for further installation instructions.

### 1.4 Intelligence

### **Dual Function Power Button**

Depending on the setting in the Soft-Off By Power-Button field of the Power Management Setup, this switch allows the system to enter the Soft -Off or Suspend mode.

### External Modem Ring-on: - Optional for the 601BS4

The Modem Ring-on feature allows the system that is in the Suspend mode or Soft Power Off mode to wake-up/power-on to respond to incoming calls. This feature supports external modem only.

### RTC Timer to Power-on the System

The RT C installed on the system board allows your system to automatically poweron on the set date and time.

### Wake-On-LAN Ready :- Optional for the 601BS4

The Wake-On-LAN function allows the network to remotely wake up a Soft Power Down (Soft -Off) PC. Your LAN card must support the remote wakeup function. The 5VSB power source of your power supply must be at least 720mA.

### ACPI Ready

The mainboard is designed to meet the ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power Interface) specification. ACPI has energy saving features supporting OS Direct Power Management (OSPM) for round the clock PC operation.

# Chapter 2 - Hardware Installation

Before you start installation, a grounded anti-static mat is recommended. Attached an anti static wristband to your wrist and have it grounded to the same point as the anti-static mat.

The following steps must be completed before you can use your PC:

Configure the Mainboard Settings. Install Central Processing Unit (CPU). Install Memory Modules. Install Expansion Cards. Connect Ribbon Cables, Panel Wires and Power Supply.

### 2.1 Installation of Processor (CPU)

Before you install the processor, make sure that you have an approved Heat Sink with Cooling Fan. Without proper heat sink with cooling fan will damage the processor and mainboard.

To install your processor, please do the following:

- 1. Locate a small dot marked on top of the CPU. The marking indicate Pin 1 of the CPU.
- 2. Locate the Socket Pin 1 marking on the mainboard.
- 3. Push the lever sideway and lift it upwards to 90-degree angle. Insert the CPU into the Socket. Please make sure that the CPU Pin 1 is insert to the socket Pin 1 location
- Install an approved heat sink with cooling fan for proper heat dissipation. Falling to install a heat sink with cooling fan may cause overheating and burnout your CPU.
- 5. Snap back the lever into place.

Caution! Be careful not to scrape the mainboard when mounting a clampstyle processor fan to prevent damage to the mainboard.

### 2.2 Installing of DIMM Memory

 This mainboard uses only Dual Inline Memory Module. Sockets are available for 3.3-volt (power level) un-buffered Synchronous Dynamic Random Access (SDRAM) memory system of 64, 128 or 256MB.



2. It support single-side or double-side SDRAM DIMM module and the maximum memory size supported is 1GB.

This mainboard supports PC-100 and PC-133 DIMM modules. You may choose the memory access time by using the CMOS setup utility. (Refer to CMOS setup "DRAM Clock"). There are three different choices in the CMOS setup program for selection:

**CPU:** You should select this option if you installed the CPU and SDRAM DIMM with the same speed. For example, 133MHz CPU with PC133 SDRAM DIMM.

**CPU +33M:** You should select this option if you use 100MHz CPU with PC133 SDRAM DIMM or 66MHz CPU with PC100 SDRAM DIMM. In other word, you have installed a lower speed CPU with higher speed SDRAM DIMM.

**CPU –33M:** You should select this option if you use a higher speed CPU with lower speed SDRAM DIMM. For example, using 133MHz CPU with PC100 SDRAM DIMM.

### 2.3 Internal Connectors

### 2.3.1 PCI Slots

Both PCI and PCI expansion cards may require IRQs, this mainboard complies with Plug and Play (PnP) specification that allows automatic system configuration whenever a PnP compliant card is added. For PnP card, IRQs are asigned automatically for those available.

### 2.3.2 Floppy Disk Drive Connector

This connector supports two Floppy drives. Uses the ribbon cable provided and make sure that the red strip is connected to PIN 1 of the connector.

### 2.3.3 Primary and Secondary IDE Connectors

Each IDE connector supports two IDE drives. If you install two hard drives, you need to configure the second drive to Slave mode. Please refer to the hard drive manual for appropriate jumper setting.

### 2.3.4 Standard Infrared (SIR) Connector

# Optional for the 601BS4

This IR connector (SIR) supports optional wireless transmitting and receiving infrared module. You must configure the setting through URAT2 to select whether URAT2 is directed for use with COM 2 or IrDa.

### 2.3.5 Serial Port 2 (Com 2) Connector Optional for the 601BS4

This connector allows you to add on an additional serial port (Com 2). The serial port cable is optional and needs to be purchased separately.

### 2.3.6 Cooling and Chassis Fan Power Connector

Please install your cooling fan to the power connector CN13. If the hardware-monitoring feature is installed, you could monitor the rotating speed of the CPU cooling fan in your Windows operating system. The Chassis Fan must be connected to CN17

### 2.3.7 ATX Power Connector

This connector connects to an ATX power supply. The plug from the power supply can only be inserted in one orientation because of the different hole sizes. Find the correct Orientation, make sure that the pins are aligned then push down firmly.



Important! Ensure that your ATX power supply can supply at least 10mA on the +5 volt standby lead (+5VSB).

# 2.3.8 WOL (Wake On LAN) Connector

### Optional for the 601BS4

This connector needs to be connected to a LAN card with Wake-On-LAN output. The connector powers up the system when a wakeup packet or signal is received through the LAN card. In order to use the WOL LAN card to trigger the power of the PC system, the switching power supply must be able to provide at least 720mA current driving ability on the "5V Standby" voltage.

### 2.3.9 CD Audio-in Connector

The CD audio-in connectors on the board are used to connect CD ROM audio out. There are two different types of connectors. Please insert the correct connector supplied to the appropriate connector.

Connector with housing (CN22) is optional for the 601AS and 601BS4

### 2.3.10 USB (Universal Serial Bus) 3 and 4 Connector

Apart from two USB ports available onboard the ATX connector, these connectors allow you to add on an optional kit to expand the total USB to supports 4 USB devices. It's support the Front Utility Panel.

Please ensure that the USB Cable you intend to connect to these USB port have the same pin assignment to avoid damage or burn out of the mainboard.

### 2.3.11 System Panel buttons and LED connectors

- PW = Power on/off and Suspend Switch Connector
- SL = Sleep LED Connector
- ΗL = HDD LED Connector
- RS = Reset Button Connector



### Power On / Off and External Suspend Switch Connector

The Power On/Off connector has two functions. It can be the Power Switch or Suspend Switch of your PC system. You can either choose "Delay 4 Sec or Instant OFF" (Please refer to the BIOS setup in Chapter 3)

Option 1: If you choose "Delay 4 Sec." In the BIOS CMOS Setup, the function of "PW" will be:

When system power is "OFF", press this switch, the system will power on. When system power is "ON", you can select two different mode: Α.

Mode 1: Press the Power ON button and release (less than 4 seconds); the system will be turned into Suspend mode (turn into the GREEN mode) When the system is in Suspend mode:

Press the Power on button (less than 4 seconds), the system will return to Full-ON mode.

Press and hold the Power On Button for more than 4 seconds, the system will be powered off.

Mode 2: Press and hold the Power ON button for more than 4 seconds, the system will be completely powered off.

Option 2: If you choose "Instant OFF." In the BIOS CMOS Setup, it will operate like normal ON / OFF Power button.

This LED when lighted indicate that the AC power is "ON" but your system is switch "OFF". When the led is unlighted indicated that either the AC power is "OFF/UNCONNECTED" or the system is switch "ON".

When connect to the chassis HDD connector, read and write activity by HDD will cause the LED to light

When connected to the chassis reset button, you can reset your PC when press this button.

# 2.3.12 Speaker and Power LED Connector

### **Speaker Connector**

Connect your chassis speaker to the four pins connector "A". It allows you to hear systems beeps and warnings sound.

# Front Panel Power LED Connector

Connect your chassis Power LED connector to the four pins connector "B".

# 2.3.13 Front Audio Connector

The Front Audio Connector is used together with the Front Utility Panel. When they are connected together you can easily plug your ear-phone, MIC and Audio to the front panel of your case. Please consult your dealer for more details about Front Utility Panel.

### 2.4 External Connectors

Ribbon cable should always be connected with the red strip to the PIN 1 on the connector of the devices such as CD ROM and Hard Drive. Check the connector for Pin 1 before installation.

Some pins are used for connectors or power sources. These are different from jumpers in the mainboard layout. Placing jumper caps on these jumpers will cause damage to the mainboard.



### 2.4.1 PS/2 Mouse and Keyboard Connector

This connector only supports PS/2 mouse and keyboard plugs. If you have a standard AT size (large DIN) keyboard plug, you need to use a mini DIN adapter.

### 2.4.2 Serial Port COM 1 Connector

This serial port is available for mouse and other serial devices. (I/O addresses used are 3F8H/2F8H/3E8H/2E8H and IRQ3/IRQ4, selected by CMOS setup)

### 2.4.3 Parallel Port Connector

This parallel port for use in printer supports SPP/EPP/ECP modes, IRQ7 or IRQ5 is selectable, ECP mode will use either DMA 3 or DMA 1 which can be selected by the BIOS setup program.

### 2.4.4 Universal Serial Bus (USB) Port 1 & 2

Two USB ports are available for connecting USB devices.

The mainboard is also equipped with an expansion connector that supports two additional USB external connectors. (The USB cable is not included in with the mainboard).

### 2.4.5 Audio/Game Port Connector

There is the 3D audio interface built on this mainboard.

### 2.4.6 VGA Connector

The 601AM, 601BM and 601AS mainboards are integrated with onboard 2x AGP VGA . The 601BM4 and 601BS4 mainboards are integrated with onboard 4x AGP VGA . Simply connect your VGA Monitor Adapter to this connector.

### 2.5 Jumper Settings

Jumper are built on the mainboard to allow the user the flexibility to configure maniboard setting to meet their specific requirements. When there is no jumper cap insert into the jumper, it is called "OPEN" and when it will insert with Jumper cap, it is known as "SHORT".

Below is the example and picture of a "SHORT" Setting.

# JP 1 Clear CMOS Data

Basically, all BIOS CMOS data are stored in the CMOS memory. At time, you may need to clear the store data due to problems with some setup devices, loss of security password...etc.

### **Clear CMOS Data Procedure**

- 1. Unplug your PC.
- 2. Remove jumper from Pin 1 and 2 of JP1.
- 3. Plug jumper into the PIN 2 and PIN 3.
- 4. Wait for 3 seconds and plug the jumper back to Pin 1 and 2
- 5. Turn on your PC.
- 6. Press the <Delete> button during boot up and enter the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility to re-enter new password again.

### JP 2: CPU Voltage Adjustment Optional for the 601BS4

This feature is included in order to allow you to adjust the CPU voltage manually. When you "SHORT" the jumper, the CPU Voltage is raised by 0.05V against the normal voltage.

# Chapter 3 - Managing the PC BIOS

### 3.1 Award BIOS CMOS Setup Utility

The EEPROM on the mainboard stores the AWARD BIOS CMOS Setup Utility to allow you to configure your system. Anytime, you wish to configure your system BIOS, you need to run BIOS CMOS Setup Utility (for example, you may wish to set the Security Password System or changing your Power Management Setting).

### Entering Setup

Each time when you start your computer, the system provides you with the opportunity to run the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility. Immediately when you turn on your system, press the <Delete> button to call up the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility.

The BIOS CMOS Setup Utility will not activate if your computer finishes the POST (Power-On-Self-Test) stage. You need to restart the system again to call up the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility. To restart the system, either you can power off, press the reset button on your chassis or simultaneously press the <Ctrl> + <Alt> + <Delete> button. The system will restart and you need to press the <Delete> immediately to call up the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility.

### **Control Keys**

At the bottom of the utility, you will notice a legend bar. The keys in the legend bar allow you to navigate through the various setup menus. The table below lists the control keys with their corresponding functions:

Up Arrow	Move to previous item.
Down Arrow	Move to next item.
Left Arrow	Move to item on the left.
Right Arrow	Move to item on the right.
Enter	Select the desired item.
F1	Display the help screen for the selected feature.
Esc Exit to the previous screen.	
PgUp(-)/PgDn(+)	Modify or change the content of the highlighted item.
F5	Restore the previous CMOS value (only the current page setup will be restored)
F7	Loads the optimized default values from BIOS default table, (only the current page setup will be loaded).
F10	Save changes to CMOS and exit setup.

### Date (mm : dd : yy)

Sets your system to the date that you specific (usually the current date). The format is month, day, and year.

### Time (hh : mm : ss)

Sets your system to the time you specific (usually the current time). The format is hour, minute, second. The time format is based on the 24-hour military-time clock. For example, 1 P.M. is 13:00:00.

### IDE Primary/Secondary Master/Slave

The mainboard supports four IDE Hard Drives. These fields allow you to set your Hard Drive parameters.



It is recommend to select Auto so that the BIOS will automatically detect the HDD. The following table will appeared, please make sure that the specification of your HDD match the drive table.

### Halt On

This field allows you to decide which type of errors you want to halt the system when detected during Power On Self Test.

# Base Memory / Extended Memory / Total Memory

This field displays the amount of memory detected by the system during boot up. This is a display only field and you don't have to make changes to this field.

### Virus Warning

When enabled, you receive a warning message if a program (specifically, a virus) attempts to write to the boot sector or the partition table of the hard disk drive. You should then run an anti-virus program. Keep in mind that this feature protects only the boot sector, not the entire hard drive.

Many disk diagnostic programs that access the boot sector table can trigger the virus-warning message. If you plan to run such a program, we recommend that you first disable the virus warning.

### CPU Internal Cache / External Cache

CPU Cache memory is additional memory that is much faster than conventional DRAM (system memory) in which is built in in the processor. IF you enable this option, when the CPU requests data, the system transfers the requested data from the main DRAM into cache memory for faster access.

### CPU L2 Cache ECC Checking

When you select Enabled, The ECC checking will ensured the accuracy of the data stored on the L2 cache.

### **Processor Number Feature**

If have Pentium *!!!* processor installed on the mainboard, enabling this option allows the serial code inside the Pentium *!!!* processor to be published on certain application.

### **Quick Power On Self Test**

Select Enabled to reduce the amount of time required to run the power-on self-test (POST). A quick POST skips certain steps. We recommend that you normally disable quick POST. Better to find a problem during POST than lose data during your work.

### First/Second/Third/Boot Other Device

These fields allow you to decide the boot sequence of your bootable devices such as Hard Drive, CD ROM...etc.

### Swap Floppy Drive

This field is effective only in systems with two floppy drives. Selecting "Enabled" assigns physical drive B to logical drive A, and physical drive A to logical drive B.

### **Boot Up Floppy Seek**

When enabled, the BIOS tests (seeks) floppy drives to determine whether they have 40 or 80 tracks. Only 360-KB floppy drives have 40 tracks; drives with 720 KB, 1.2 MB, and 1.44 MB capacity all have 80 tracks. Because very few modern PCs have 40-track floppy drives, we recommend that you set this field to Disabled to save time.

### Boot Up NumLock Status

Toggle between On or Off to controls the state of the NumLock key when the system boots. When toggled On, the numeric keypad generates numbers instead of controlling cursor operations.

### Security Option

This field allows you to select Setup or System Security option and it needs to work along with the "Set Supervisor Password" in the main menu.

When "Setup" option is selected, you will be prompt to input your "Passwords" before you can start the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility. When you select "System" option, you will be prompt to input your password in order to load the Operation System (Window OS or Linux OS).

### Forgotten Your Password

If you happen to forget your password, you can clear the password by erasing the CMOS Real Time Clock (RTC) Ram. Please refer to page 18 under "JP6 Clear CMOS Data".

### OS Select For DRAM > 64MB

Select OS2 only if you are running OS/2 operating system with greater than 64 MB of RAM on your system. Otherwise, use the default setting "Non-OS2" for all other operating systems.

### HDD S.M.A.R.T Capability

If your Hard Drive support the S.M.A.R.T. technology (Self Monitoring Analysis Reporting Technology) feature, you may "enable" this item to monitor and report your Hard Drive healthy status. Check with your Hard Drive Vendor for further information about SMART feature.

ACPI function

### When "Setup" is selected in Security Option

If you want to change the BIOS setting, you will have to key-in the Supervisor Password so that you can start the BIOS CMOS Setup Utility and change the system setting.

# When "System" is selected in Security Option

When turn on the PC system, it will request you to enter the Password in order to boot up your system. Without the correct password, the PC system will stop and the operation system will not be loaded.

The User Password can be used to check the user's authority. However, this password entry is different from the "SUPERVISOR PASSWORD" mentioned in previous section. The User Password will have different function according to the "Supervisor Password" and the "Security Option" setup:

### A. When there is a password stored in the "SUPERVISOR PASSWORD"

### • When "Setup" is selected in Security Option:

When you use the "User Password" to log into the BIOS setup program, you can only select "User Password", "SAVE & EXIT SETUP" and "EXIT WITHOUT SAVING" from the main menu. (Using Supervisor Password to log into the PC system, you will have the complete right to access all BIOS settings.)

### When "System" is selected in Security Option:

When turn on the PC system, it will request you to enter the Password. Without correct password, PC system will stop and the operation system won't be loaded.

### B. When there is no password stored in the "SUPERVISOR PASSWORD"

### When "Setup" is selected in Security Option:

Users can use the "User Password" to log into the BIOS setup program, and they can make all the change in the BIOS setup program.

### When "System" is selected in Security Option:

When turn on the PC system, it will request you to enter the Password. Without the correct password, the PC system will stop and the operation system will not be loaded.

### Save & Exit Setup

This option will save all setup values to CMOS RAM & EXIT SETUP routine. Move the selection bar to "SAVE & EXIT SETUP" and press "Enter" key, then types "Y" and "Enter" key, the values will be saved and all the information will be stored in the CMOS memory.

### **Exit Without Saving**

This item exits the setup routine without saving any changed values to CMOS RAM, When you do not want to save your change to the CMOS memory, you may choose to run this option and the setting what you made in the BIOS setup routine will be abundant.
